
If you receive your newsletter electronically, you will receive an email if we do not get your renewal.

Edgar County Genealogy Library News

The Genealogy Library might be small, but we do have a lot of information that you will not find anywhere else. Some of our databases are: *The Chrisman Courier* database with over 100K entries, Master index to about 60 scrapbooks; the 172 Cemeteries containing over 55,300 people; and of course the local newspaper on micro-film from 1849 – 1954 (however some issues are missing during the Civil War time frame); Edgar County History Books; 8 volume of Marriages 1823-1914; Censuses, and 12 shelves of family histories. Patrons have visited from Joplin and St. Louis MO.; Lebanon and Indianapolis, IN.; Battle Lake, MI., as well as many from around the Paris area.

We have great news - the newspapers 1955 – 1987 (the black hole, as we referred to them) are no longer missing! Those years of newspapers have been donated to the Paris Public Library, since they are open more hours than the Genealogy Library. Paris Public Library has the same micro-reading machine as we have.

Gleanings from local newspapers

Paris Daily News, Thursday, March 27, 1919

Fred L. **Adams**, 59 years old, proprietor of the Star Bakery for twenty years, died at 10:05 o'clock Thursday morning at the family home in East Madison street. He had been in ill health for four years but suffered a complete nervous breakdown two months ago. Two weeks ago he went to Rochester, Minn. and received treatment at the Mayo Brothers' sanitarium, and later went to a Chicago sanitarium. He was brought home last Saturday evening and his condition since has been extremely critical.

Mr. **Adams** was born at Ogdensburg, N. Y. and came to Paris 25 years ago from Carthage, N. J. He opened the Star Bakery of the west side of the square and for 20 years continued this business with much success. After disposing of his bakery five years ago he was interested in city real estate.

The deceased was married in 1904 to Alice **Seibert** of Columbus, O. He is survived by two children, Charlotte and John, also his father, John Q. **Adams** and a sister, Mrs. J. B **Wheater** of Ogdensburg, N. Y., and a brother, George **Adams** of Lebanon, Ind. His father is 94 years old.

Mr. **Adams** was an active member of the Elks lodge. He was a man highly esteemed by the entire community, having a smile and a good word for everyone he would meet.

Mr. and Mrs. Al **Hopper** of Hume, Ill., received a message from the war department this week announcing the death of their nephew, Leroy **Ewell**. The young man was killed in action on October 16.

Mr. **Ewell** was 17 years old, and enlisted in Indianapolis more than a year ago. He was a member of the Sixth field artillery.

He was born at Hume and was the son of John **Ewell**, whose whereabouts are unknown. He had made his home since a small child with his grandmother, Mrs. Charity **Ewell**, and after her death several years ago had lived with Mr. and Mrs. **Hopper** and with relatives in Indianapolis.

Mrs. Minerva **Walters**, 36 years old, a former resident of Paris, died Wednesday morning at St. Anthony's hospital in Terre Haute. The body was removed yesterday afternoon to the family home, 54 South Tenth and One-half street.

Minerva **Dawson**, daughter of the late Thomas and Jane **Dawson**, was born at Nevins, Ill., and had spent most of her life in Paris. She was married about 15 years ago to Milton Walters, who survives together with three children, Frances, Lillie and Max.

Mrs. **Walters** is also survived by four sisters and one brother: Mrs. Nettie **Brenneman**, Mrs. Ira **Brown** of Paris, Mrs. Minnie **Bonesteel** of Danville of Danville, Mrs. Mahala **Ketner** and Frank **Dawson** of Terre Haute.

Miss Letitia McKee, formerly of Paris, is dangerously ill at the American hospital in Chicago.

Mr. and Mrs. A. H. **Metcalfe** of North street are the parents of a son, born Saturday night. Names Daniel Howe, Mrs. **Metcalfe** was formerly Miss Josephine **Burns**.

Paris Daily News, Thursday, March 27, 1919 (con't)

The funeral of Mrs. John T. **Wiley** will be held at the family residence two miles south of Kansas, Ill., at 10 o'clock Friday morning, the Rev. Mr. **Fonger**, pastor of the Kansas Christian church officiating. Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery.

Mrs. Wiley died at 2 o'clock Wednesday morning of heart trouble, having been a sufferer of this disease for several years.

The deceased was formerly Anna **Shy**, daughter of Samuel **Shy**, and was born 74 years ago at Lexington, Ky. She came to Edgar county as a small child. In 1864 she was united in marriage to John T. **Wiley**. He passed away six year ago.

She is survived by one daughter, Lulu, at home, and four sons, Allen O., New York, Paul of Evansville, Ind., Walker of Kansas, Ill., and Shy **Wiley** of Clinton, Ind.

There are also three brothers and one sister, Edward **Shy**, Woodward, Okla., John **Shy**, Mishawaka, Ind., Grant **Shy**, California, and Mrs. Laura **Lair**, Paris, Ky. Mrs. **Wiley** leaves seven grandchildren, four of whom make their home with her.

Mr. Henry **Bull** died at his home in Kansas, Ill. last Monday at the advanced age of 80 years.

John S. **Smith** and Miss Mattie **McKee** were married by Elder H. M **Brooks**, at the residence of the bride's parents on West Court street last night.

Harrison **Pinkston** and Mrs. Lucy **Grant** were married by Rev. S. R. **Cottrell** at the residence of Troy **Porter**, South Main street, last Thursday evening. The bride is a sister of Mrs. **Porter**.

The Paris Gazette, Wednesday, November 30, 1881

Nuptials of Mr. George H. Augustus and Miss Ora Beatrice Redmon

The particular Society event of the past week was the marriage of the above-names parties, at the Christian Church in this city, Thursday evening, Nov. 24, at 7 1/2 o'clock p.m. and the reception to the contracting parties at the residence of the groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. O. **Augustus**, on East Madison street.

Perry **Huston**, of the St. George Hotel, Evansville, Ind., is visiting parents and friends in this city.

Dr. C. S. Laughlin and wife left yesterday for Savanah, to be gone a week, and will take in the Atlanta Cotton Exposition.

Byron **Few**, of Bloomington, Ill., was in the city last week. He came to attend the funeral of Mrs. John D. **Wallace** of whom he was a relative.

Mrs. Walter F. Collady and child, of Decatur, are visiting Mrs. C's mother, Mrs. James Shoaff.

H. C. Fancher has resigned the agency of the Singer sewing machine company in this city.

The Paris Gazette, Wednesday, November 30, 1881 (Con't)

Died in this city Thursday, Nov. 24, 1881, of paralysis. Mrs. Sarah Vance, widow of the late William B. Vance, aged 71 years, 8 months and 17 days.

Mrs. Vance was the third wife of Wm. B. Vance, who died in this city, Sept. 17, 1875 at the age of 79 years and 45 days. Mrs. Vance was the mother of Joseph W., Wm. K and Wesley Vance. She was married to W. B. Vance in 1842, after which marriage she united with the Presbyterian Church, having previously been a member of the Methodist Church. She was a faithful and devoted Christian mother, beloved by all who knew her. A week or two before he death she was suddenly stricken with paralysis, depriving her of her speech, and rendering her entirely helpless. But she has passed beyond the shore of that Beautiful River into the light of perfect day.

Died in Terre Haute, Monday, Nov. 21st, Lucius Booth, aged - years.

The friends of Lucius **Booth** were surprised as well as pained, to learn of his death, which occurred in Terre Haute, on Monday of last week, Nov. 21st. He had many friends in this city. He was the brother of the late Walter **Booth**, of this city, and of Senator **Booth** of California. He was the youngest son of Mr. & Mrs. Beebe **Booth** who survives him and his brother Walter. Residing with his aged parents, he was a tender and loving son, watching over them in their advanced years, little expecting that he would be taken away before they had finished their days on earth. It had been a half century, before death had broken the home of these aged parents, when the Reaper came, a few months ago and gathered their oldest son, Walter, to his last home - now followed by the youngest, Lucius, whose remains were brought to this city and lad away in Edgar Cemetery last Wednesday afternoon.

Died, in this city Monday, Nov. 28th, 1881, of paralysis, David A. Woodbridge, aged 72 years, 2 months and 26 days.

Mr. Woodbridge was born in New London Co., Conn., Sept. 2, 1809. During his early life he learned the trade of a shoemaker, and at the age of 21, started into life for himself and removed to Columbus, Ohio, where he engaged in the mercantile life. He was married to Miss Carrie J. Doane, of Lancaster, O., July 16, 1839. She died August 24, 1840, leaving one child, Carrie (deceased). After the death of his wife and child he traveled considerably, finally settling in this city and engaged in the mercantile business with Dodd & Co., continuing with them two years, when he engaged as clerk with Walter Booth, and became a partner after six year's service. In 1869, he sold out to Mr. Booth, and embarked, with W. H Geohegan, in the planning mill and lumber business, in which he continued until 1874, since which time he has been out of business. He married for his second wife, Mrs. Mary K. Woodbridge, of this city, in April 1869. While sitting in the chair last Saturday shaving himself, he fell over, from the effects of a paralytic stroke, lingering until Monday forenoon when he passed peacefully away to the land beyond.

Wm. Osborn **Gilkey**, of Ross Township died at the residence of Jonathan **Gaines**, in said township last Saturday. He was a native of Kentucky, being born six miles south of Mt. Sterling, the county seat of Montgomery county. His remains were taken to his old home for burial where he had, sometime ago bought a lot in the Cemetery an purchased a monument for himself. The writer of his has known him since his early boyhood, and can attest to his many social virtues. He was a bachelor, well known for many years in this county as a moxt excellent and estimable citizen.

Paris Daily Beacon, Wednesday, July 16, 1895

Marriage license was taken out at the county clerk's office today by a strangely assorted couple. They were John **Mulverhill**, a bearded and bronzed man of 51, and Emma G. **Martin**, a timid, bashful county girl of fifteen. Both parties hailed from Kansas and were accompanied by the father of the bride, who gave his consent that the license could be issued.
