BLACKHAWK WAR SOLDIERS OF EDGAR COUNTY

In 1832, there was a call for volunteers to fight the Indians led by Chief Blackhawk returning to Illinois from Iowa. Three companies from Edgar County were formed. These companies were led by Captain Isaac **Sanford**, Captain Robert **Griffin**, and Captain Jonathan **Mayo**. In this issue the men of Captain **Sanford's** company are listed. Others will be listed in future issues. The reference for this information is *Record of the Services of Illinois Soldiers in the Black Hawk War (1831-32) and the Mexican War (1846-48)*, by Isaac H. Elliott, Journal Company, Printers and Binders, Springfield, ILL, 1902. This book is available at the Edgar County Genealogy Library.

BLACK HAWK WAR SOLDIERS

CAPTAIN ISAAC SANFORD'S COMPANY

1st Regiment, 2nd Brigade of Illinois Mounted Volunteers, called into the service of the United States, on the requisition of Gen. **Atkinson**, by the Governor's proclamation, dated May 15, 1832. This company was organized in Edgar County, May 10, 1832. Mustered out August 15, 1832, by order of Brig. Gen. **Atkinson**.

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT

Harry Perisho, the Victim of a Distressing Accident

A distressing accident occurred at the Marley & Brown mill yard shortly after noon today. Harry **Perisho**, a farmer residing on the Grandview road, southwest of the city, had driven in with a load of wheat and was attempting to turn around on the narrow level east of the mill. He made a miscalculation and the wheels of the wagon slipped over the incline, which slopes abruptly away from the level. The vehicle was not upset, but Mr. **Perisho** was thrown from his position on top of the load, falling a distance of possible eight or ten feet. It was seen at once that he was unable to rise, and when the spectators went to his assistance they found him very seriously injured. His right leg was broken at the thigh and again near the knee, the right arm also being fractured at the wrist. There was also a severe contusion of the scalp and other bruises. The extent of Mr. **Perisho's** injuries is remarkable considering the simple character of the accident. Had the wagon been overturned on him, such a result might have been expected, but the mishap was one, which in nine cases out of ten, would not have caused any damage beyond a few scratches.

The injured man was taken into the mill office and Dr. W. W. **Wilson** was summoned, applying temporary dressing to the injuries. Mr. **Perisho** was then taken to the home of his sister, Mrs. W. L. **Hinds**, on West Madison street, where he will remain for the time being. He is about forty years of age and unmarried, being the son of Mrs. Mary **Perisho**, who lives south of Grandview.

DILLARD B. TUCKER DIES AT CHRISMAN

Pioneer Citizen Who Came Here from Kentucky a Half Century Ago

The death of Dillard B. **Tucker**, a pioneer citizen of Edgar county, occurred Wednesday at his home in Chrisman. The deceased was born at Paris, Bourbon county, Ky, December 5, 1840, being a little over sixty-six years of age. He came to Illinois at the age of seventeen, settling in Edgar county, which has since been his home. In 1859 he decided to try a mining venture in Colorado, going by rail to Leavenworth, thence, by team, across the great plains to Pike's peak. After a few months, he returned and took up agricultural pursuits until the outbreak of the civil war, when he answered the first call for volunteers, enlisting in Co. A, Seventh Illinois Cavalry. He served in all, four years and three months, making an excellent record as a soldier and participating in a number of important engagements.

Subsequent to the war, Mr. **Tucker** purchased a farm and the remainder of his life was devoted to that line of activity. He was married December 31, 1865, to Miss Lovina **Brothers** of Edgar township, and to them were born two daughters, who survive. The mother died in 1882, and Mr. **Tucker** contracted a second marriage with Mrs. Mary **Parks**, who survives him, together with a son and two daughters. Mrs. Elizabeth **Roberts** of this city is a sister of the deceased. Mr. **Tucker** was a republican in politics and served acceptably in various public capacities. He was identified with the Baptist church, since the age of eighteen and was a member of the G. A. R. post at Chrisman. Genial, obliging and courteous, he was liked by everyone and was a most worthy representative of a most excellent ancestry. Funeral services were conducted this morning at Chrisman, interment being made in the cemetery there.

DEATH SUMMONS SUDDEN FOR PARIS LEADER OF SOCIETY

Death came suddenly today to Mrs. Emmalyne **Russell Hoenig**, wife of Walter D. **Hoenig**, owner of the Jones Store, and one of the best-known society women of Paris.

Mrs. **Hoenig** was a guest at a luncheon in the Hotel Wolford given by Mrs. Caleb **Stanfield** of Paris and her daughter, Mrs. Irving **Castle**, of Ridgefarm, which was to be succeeded by a bridge party at which there were a hundred guests.

Following the luncheon, Mrs. **Hoenig** and a group of friends were talking in the lobby when she suddenly collapsed and fell to the floor. While some of her friends sought to restore her to consciousness, other hurriedly summoned physicians. Dr. Melvin **Hole** and Dr. H. F. **Hooker** responded promptly, but before they reached the hotel, Mrs. **Hoenig** had passed away. The physicians expressed the opinion that a blood clot on the brain caused death. The body was taken to the office of the coroner for an investigation.

Mrs. **Hoenig's** maiden name was Emmalyne **Russell**, and she was born in Paris. The family later moved to Decatur. She married Walter **Hoenig**, prominent businessman about twenty years ago.

She is survived by her husband, a brother, Dr. James **Russell**; and four sisters, Mrs. Alice **Heiner**, Mrs. Stella **Durbin**, Mrs. Nell **Shulke** and Mrs. Mary **Collins**, all of Decatur. She was an active member of the St. Mary's Catholic church.

Mr. **Hoenig** received word shortly after the collapse and hurried to Danville. Miss Blanche **Baber**, who was a guest at the party, had just entered the lobby as Mrs. **Hoenig** fell, and assisted in the necessary details of the sad affair. The announcement of Mrs. **Hoenig's** untimely demise caused a profound shock throughout the entire community.

*Note: Emmalyne (1864-1927) was a great granddaughter of Aloysius **Brown** and Elizabeth **Drury Brown**, very early pioneers, who settled in the North Arm area of Edgar County.*

OBITUARY

The Reaper Death and his Harvest—Demise of Four old Citizens

VANCE

Died in this city Thursday, Nov. 24, 1881, of paralysis, Mrs. Sarah **Vance**, widow of the late William B. **Vance**, aged 71 years, 8 months and 17 days.

Mrs. **Vance** was the third wife of Wm. B. **Vance**, who died in this city, Sept., 1875 at the age of 79 years and 45 days. Mrs. Vance was the mother of Joseph W., Wm K. and Wesley **Vance**. She was married to W. B. **Vance** in 1842, after which marriage she united with the Presbyterian Church, having been a member of the Methodist Church. She was a faithful and devoted Christian mother, beloved by all who knew her. A week or two before her death she was suddenly stricken with paralysis, depriving her of her speech, and rendering her entirely helpless. But she has passed beyond the shore of that Beautiful River into the light of perfect day.

BOOTH

Died in Terre Haute, Monday, Nov. 21st, Lucius Booth aged 43 years.

The friends of Lucius **Booth**, were surprised as well as pained, to learn of his death, which occurred in Terre Haute, on Monday of last week, Nov. 21st. He had many friends in this city. He was the brother of the late Walter **Booth**, of this city, and of Senator **Booth** of California. He was the youngest son of Mr. & Mrs. Beebe **Booth**, who survives him and his brother, Walter. Residing with his aged parents, he was a tender and loving son, watching over them in their advanced years. Little expecting that he would be taken away before they had finished their days on earth. It had been a half century, before death had broken the home circle of these aged parents, when the Reaper came, a few months ago and gathered the oldest son, Walter, to his last home—now followed by the youngest, Lucius, whose remains were brought to this city and laid to rest.

WOODBIDGE

Died in this city Monday, Nov. 28th, 1881, of paralysis, David A. **Woodbridge**, aged 72 years, 2 months, and 26 days.

Mr. **Woodbridge** was born in New London, Conn., Sept 2, 1809. During his early life he learned the trade of a shoemaker, and at the age of 21, started into life for himself and removed to Columbus, Ohio, where he engaged in mercantile life. He was married to Miss Carrie J. **Doane** of Lancaster, O., July 16, 1839. She died August 24, 1840, leaving one child, Carrie(deceased). After the death of his wife and child he traveled considerable, finally settling in this city and engaged in the mercantile business with **Dodd & Co.**, continuing with them two years, when he engaged as clerk with Walter **Booth**, and became a partner after six years service. In 1869 he sold out to Mr. **Booth**, and embarked, with Mr. W. H. **Geohegan**, in the planing mill and lumber business, in which he continued until 1874, since which time, he has been out of business. He married for his second wife, Mrs. Mary K. **Woodbridge**, of this city, in April 1869. While sitting in the chair last Saturday shaving himself, he fell over, from the effects of a paralytic stroke, lingering until Monday forenoon when he passed peacefully away to the land beyond.

GILKEY

Wm. Osborn **Gilkey**, of Ross township died at the residence of Jonathan **Gaines**, in said township last Saturday. He was a native of Kentucky, being born six miles south of Mt. Sterling, the county seat of Montgomery county. His remains were taken to his old home for burial where he had, sometime ago, bought a lot in the Cemetery and purchased a monument for himself. The writer of this has known him since his early boyhood, and can attest to his many social virtues. He was a bachelor, well known for many years in this county as a most excellent and estimable citizen.
